8. **ETHICS:** Articulate and apply ethics, values and ideals that demonstrate awareness of current societal challenges.


PROGRAMME SPECIFIC OUTCOMES

Course Title: Indian Constitution (Semester-I)

- I. To understand the philosophy of Indian constitutions.
- II. Introducing the Indian Constitution with a focus on the evolution of it and examining the essence of the Preamble.
- III. Examining the Fundamental Rights and Duties of Indian citizens with a study of the significance and status of Directive Principles.
- IV. Critically analyzing the important institutions of the Indian Union: the Executive: President; Prime Minister, Council of Ministers; Governor, Chief Minister and Council of Ministers; The legislature: RajyaSabha, Lok Sabha, Speaker, Committee System, State Legislature, The Judiciary: Supreme Court and the High Court: composition and functions- Judicial Activism.

Course Title: Indian Politics (Semester-II)

- I. The basic objective of the paper is to understand Centre-State Relations with focus on the Legislative, Administrative and Financial Relations.


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- II. Critically evaluating the Indian Party system – its development and looking at the ideology of dominant national parties.
- III. Evaluating the Electoral Process in India with focus on the Election Commission: Composition, Functions and Role.

Course Title: Indian Political Thinkers-I (Semester-III)

- I. The paper shall introduce the most prominent Indian Political Thinkers like Ram Mohan Roy, Swami Dayanand Saraswasti, Gopal Krishan Ghokhle, Bal Gangadhar Tilak,
- II. It shall also explain the ideas of Aurobindo Ghosh, Swami Vivekanand and Lala Lajpat Rai
- III. The basic objective of the paper is to help the students to develop a comprehensive understanding of the basics of Indian political thought.

Course Title: Indian Political Thinkers-II (Semester-IV)


- I. The paper shall introduce the most prominent Indian Political Thinkers like Jai Parkash Naryan, Ram Manohar Lohia, Mahatma Gandhi and M.N Roy.
- II. It shall also explain the ideas of Jawaharlal Nehru, B.R Ambedkar and Bhagat Singh
- III. The basic objective of the paper is to help the students to develop a comprehensive understanding of the basics of Indian political thought.

Course Title: Comparative Politics (Semester-V)

- I. It explains about evolution of Comparative Politics as a domain, its methods and theories with a focus on politics in different nations in a comparative perspective.
- II. The basic objective of the paper to understand the different approaches of Comparative Politics like Input –Out approach, Political Culture approach and Political Development approach.
- III. It shall also explain the idea of constitutionalism and its different types.

Course Title: Comparative Constitution of U.K and USA (Semester-VI)

- I. To introduce the students to the constitution of USA and U.K – their political processes, party system and institutions.
- II. To explain the constitution of USA and political tradition, federalism, pattern of democracy, political parties and interest groups.
- III. To explain the constitution of UK and its political tradition, pattern of democracy, political parties and interest groups.


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
